We can all remember our baby's first step.... the excitement, the pride, and the realization that our child is on his way. We at **ETC** experienced this same pleasure when Chottu Majhi took his first step after being disabled for nine years.

Chottu lives in a remote village of Burdwan district in West Bengal. After he was struck down with polio at the age of five, he dragged his body from place to place. No one





dreamed he would ever walk again, including his doctors, who gave him a hand-operated tricycle so that he would have some mobility.

An important part of **Empower The Children's** mission is to help disabled children; therefore, there was no hesitancy in our decision to sponsor Chottu Majhi's surgery. At the age of 14, he was admitted to the Rehabilitation Centre for Children (RCFC). Following surgery and physiotherapy, Chottu was trained to use crutches. In a short time, he was viewing the world from a new perspective. After surgery, Chottu said, "I feel that my dark days are over. Now that I can walk again...my dream has come true."

It was a long way from India to Scotland for Sultana Khanam, but she was more than ready to make the trip. As a young girl she had dared to dream of attending college, yet her goal seemed unattainable. Her parents were poor and illiterate and, with seven other mouths to feed, they had more important priorities than sending their daughter to college.

A chance meeting between John Auchard, Washington Post correspondent, and Rosalie changed the course of Sultana's life. His highly publicized article which featured **Empower The Children** and Sultana's family resulted in donations earmarked for her college education. She enrolled in the Institute of Advanced Hotel Management in Kolkata, completed an internship at a five-star hotel and was then selected to become an exchange student at Napier University in Edinburgh, Scotland. With the help

of an anonymous ETC benefactor, Sultana reached

her goal!

On her graduation day, Sultana proudly made her way to the podium. As she received her diploma, she would not let go of the chancellor's hand. The audience laughed with delight as they saw her beaming face and her infectious smile.

Sultana is now employed at the Marriot Hotel in Edinburgh. Her next goal? "That's easy...helping my sister to reach *her* star....a career in nursing....and then five more to go!"



Preyrona II Brings Hope

It is difficult to imagine the crowded conditions which exist in Dakhindari, with as many as eight children to a room. Without proper drainage systems, stagnant rainwater collects everywhere which often attracts malaria-breeding mosquitoes. With only one public toilet to service a large number of people, health and environmental hazards abound.

Is it any wonder that parents are excited about sending their children to Preyrona II, a safe and secure environment for several hours a day? A simple lunch, often the only meal of the day, offers an added incentive for parents to educate their children.



Children from the ages five to fourteen are becoming skilled in reading, writing

and mathematics. The older students also receive prevocational training in bookbinding, painting on glass, batik, silkscreen design and stitching. Hopefully, generational menial jobs such as rickshaw pullers will become a thing of the past for our **ETC** kids.

The joy that is manifested in these young faces as they experience the world around them through **ETC's** curriculum is a tribute to **ETC** supporters like you who make it all possible.

applause and a well-deserved standing ovation!



USA Volunteers Weather Monsoon Season



The word "monsoon" evokes trepidation for the heartiest of travelers when hot seasonal winds and heavy rains descend upon the Indian subcontinent. However, when 30 volunteers from the Unity Church, USA arrived in Kolkata in September of 2007, they not only braved the monsoon season, but also had a very positive impact on the children recovering from surgery at the Rehabilitation Center for Children.

An especially festive occasion marked their visit when Karuna Chitrakar, a local artist versed in the Patua tradition, shared her special talents. For many generations West Bengal folk artists like Karuna have created colored scrolls from flowers, spices, fruits and dried mud. These scrolls are designed to be slowly unfurled to tell a story and are ultimately sung by the artists to their enthusiastic audiences. Due to changing social and economic conditions, the Patua tradition is becoming a dying art, which made this experience for the children and our volunteers a very special treat.





To everyone's delight, the volunteers and children were paired to create their own

scrolls. The volunteers received the scrolls as cherished mementos of their time spent together with the children.

The tradition of volunteerism has become very strong at **ETC**. We appreciate all those who have visited Kolkata and welcome newcomers to discover the joy in the work and festivities of **ETC's** programs.

Dream Team at St. Aloysius

On May 23d, students in the Social Justice Group at St. Aloysius Catholic School, Jackson, NJ presented Rosalie Giffoniello, co-founder of **Empower the Children**, with a check for \$2245. In April Rosalie was invited to address the students in grades 6-8. They learned of ETC's programs and she learned of the group's mission... "to think, feel, and act with justice as they address social issues and problems in the community and the world." Saddened by the poverty that affects so many slum-dwelling children in Kolkata, these students wanted to make a difference.

With this in mind, a letter-writing campaign was organized. Local businesses responded generously, donating over \$1100. Student representatives also spoke to their classmates, asking them to donate a portion of their snack money to help a needy child. The student body readily embraced this idea. In just three short weeks, students raised more than \$900.

Fr. Scott Schaffer, Pastor of St. Aloysius said, "I am so proud of all the hard work and creative ways in which our young people are using their time, talents and treasures to help others less fortunate." Rosalie added,

ETC Outreaches

KENYA... On the outskirts of Nairobi, Sister Susan runs the Mary Immaculata Primary School. Books, stationery, food and supplies for the dormitories are purchased with **ETC** funds. Most of the schoolchildren are orphans, having lost their parents to AIDS. The generosity and love of donors around the world is visible through the happy, smiling faces of these children.





CIUDAD JUAREZ, MEXICO... In one of the unincorporated areas known as 'colonias,' Dominican Sister Donna Kutusch runs Centro Santa Catalina. With the help of ETC funds, she established a day care center and started classes where children learn basic skills. Amidst stark poverty in this garbage-strewn area of Juarez, CSC has become an oasis for women and children who come for support and enrichment.

Empower The Children contributes to "*Happiness is Camping*" a summer camp in northwest NJ. Doctors, nurses, and staff members volunteer their time for children with cancer who have medical needs that would not allow them to attend a regular camp. Often campers come back year after year. Some pass on and are remembered lovingly.

ETC also donates to *Monmouth County (NJ) Child Advocacy Center*, a child-friendly facility for victims of abuse, assault, and neglect. Families can access all the professional services to begin the healing process.

"Bare Feet to Happy Feet"...Aileen Parker, an employee at Nike Shoes in Portland, Oregon, inspired her co-workers to donate 60 pairs of sneakers for the children of Kolkata. But, when Aileen and her husband Tony Nemeth arrived at Preyrona II they were surprised to learn that the new shoes were covering little feet that had never been anything but bare.





"Reading their cares away"...The Rehabilitation Center for Children (RCFC), a "home-away-from-home" for many children who are long-term surgical patients, has been granted a new library by the Indian American Education Foundation. "Trekking for ETC kids"...Irish cabinetmaker, Leonard Cooney, is an avid supporter of Empower The Children. This is his account of a special fundraiser he organized for ETC: "I wanted to do something special for the children of Kolkata, so I decided to do a trek-a-thon. I contacted my mother who agreed to organize sponsors and collect donations in Ireland. In May of 2007, I

embarked on this "high" adventure to the base camp of Annapurna.

Located in the Himalayas (House of Snow), Annapurna is the 10th highest mountain in the world and is one of the most famous Nepal treks. The trek took six days. Each passing day brought new challenges as the oxygen thinned, making it more difficult to climb. When I reached the camp summit at an altitude of 4,130 meters, I experienced a great sense of satisfaction knowing that *each step of my walk benefited a child*.

Thanks to the generous support of all the trek-a-thon donors (and Mom's help), a total of 270 euros (\$440) was collected. The children were able to celebrate the holidays with new clothes and special festivities. But more importantly, they learned that people around the world really care about them."
